On the 24th of June after much prayer along with the hard work of countless people, addressing what often seemed to be endless tasks, requiring renewed focus and redoubled emphasis on so many issues, and after much more prayer, we again welcomed children from Sandwich to Austria, from Barnstable to Houston, from France to Mexico to Camp Good News for the 2012 season. Whether swimming in Snake Pond, sliding down the “Iceberg,” sailing, fishing, canoeing, archery, tennis, soccer, arts and crafts, jumping off the boardwalk, or singing around a campfire, the aim has been to have fun!

Our staff from all around the world arrived two weeks before the children came and did a great job both preparing the physical plant and, more importantly, themselves to be committed to the campers always with a supportive and encouraging spirit based on the foundation of Christ’s love. The pre-camp time was filled with training sessions that addressed a multitude of topics such as Red Cross swimming instruction, homesickness, and child protection. National and local experts in child safety were enlisted to help us in this regard.

One such child was Edmund. He and his sister have attended camp for the last four summers. It has been great to see both of them grow and mature. Their grandparents recently wrote:

The Camp Good News song, written back in 1960 by Herb Hardie, is a wonderful way to represent the camp, since its words tell about the essence of this place and its purpose. Herb now 95 years of age, shared how he was inspired to write the song by people who would ask the staff or campers what was the Good News.

The Hardies taught music in New Jersey for nearly 30 years. He brought his family to camp for about ten years where he started a music program. Campers and staff were encouraged to bring their instruments along for the summer. The chorus would perform on Sundays when parents came to visit their children and attended worship in the outside chapel called "The Grove." Herb wrote other camp songs for the children in the Junior Choir such as "Up In The Morning." Singing is a common language for those who know how to listen and transcribe melodies into thoughts and prayer.
