Working with children makes me smile; it makes me laugh. One of my favorite moments this past summer was with little Jacob. He would cry when he went out on a kayak by himself, but on one of the final days of camp, I had a little time and Jacob wanted to go on the Hobie. The wind was light, and he could laugh and talk with me. As the wind picked up, we started to fly. He looked around and had the biggest, most beautiful smile and laugh. It was amazing for me to be apart of that. Another time I was teaching Jay to sail, I grabbed the jib sheet and let him go. We started to go up on one pontoon, but we didn't tip. Jay was overwhelmed and just couldn't get over that he was able to do that. I didn't want another tip, my pride couldn't handle it. Instead, I saw through his eyes how excited he was with that near miss.

I love to see the world through the children's eyes and impact their future about what God has in store for them. This summer God gave me this gift. Not only can I do it for this one summer, but I can do this for the rest of my life. That's a huge comfort to me because I know life throws me curve balls, but God will be there for me.
