


Dear Friends,

Paul Willard was the eldest son of Grace and Warren Wyeth Willard, the founder of Camp Good News. Back in the 1940s when Uncle Paul was around twelve years old, he wanted to work with horses on campus. So his father decided to board three or four horses at camp. Paul managed their care and rode them on the wooded trails. Boarding horses is a big operation; they needed food and supplies year around. Wyeth decided to contract a good stable in Barnstable where children could take riding lessons. This was a more practical way to conduct a very popular activity.



Throughout his life, Paul loved getting to know the campers and staff. Later in life he moved into a camp cottage and drove cross-country in his eighteen-wheeler. Paul liked to pray and read his Bible down at the waterfront. After a full life, Paul passed away on October 16, 2021, at age of eightyseven. His health had deteriorated, but as he passed from death into God's presence he had a new body. When he saw Jesus, the Bible says he would be like Him. We have peace knowing the joy of his present life. He loved the Lord and sought to please Him. We found a half empty box of Bibles he purchased to hand out to truckers. Each was signed with a familiar cross and verse used by his father. He also organized and attended a Men's Breakfast for years.

Short excerpts from letters and emails about Paul:

All of us at Anglican Church of the Resurrection are sorry for your loss.

I got to spend some time with him at his breakfasts at the golf club. What a great man he was, full of wit, intelligence, insight, and faith. I felt inspired being around him, and know that those of you who knew him better have an even greater feeling of loss. We know he's gone on to a better place, but we will miss him until we're reunited with him.... God bless you, Father Alan

Paul is a darling. What a dear man. Thanks for allowing me to connect with him. He is a pleasure and very funny.... Imagine that homecoming! And how the Lord welcomed him back, caring for him with such love and dignity.... Love Patti

He asked me if I had ever heard of Camp Good News while I was waiting for the order of food to come out. Paul gave me a pamphlet of the camp and it was soon after that that I went to the camp office to sign up my daughter for a session and ended up meeting Faith there and she offered me a job. The rest is history, they say.

I always thanked him for that meeting that day as the years passed at camp. I loved working there. Now Paul has a divine meeting with His Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. I see him surrounded by all who loved him and are in glory with him With love, Hope

Tricky Nicky



Out of the horseback-riding program inspired by Paul, Camp Good News continued to offer campers lessons at a local stable. Faith Willard came to help her father at camp and would often drive the children to the stables. Her attention was drawn to a rather sad-looking young man leading the horses. She inquired about "Nick" and was told by the instructor that he came from an unhappy situation and "maybe you could help him." The next day Faith offered him a place at camp. Two or three days after his arrival, Faith's father asked where this boy came from. Faith admitted she had felt sorry for him and enrolled him into the program. He returned for many summers and got to know Mr. Worm who nicknamed him "Tricky Nicky." Nick tells the story as follows:

When I was thirteen (1977) I came to Camp Good News for three and a half weeks. As I look back at those three and a half weeks, I can see its importance and what an impact camp had on the rest

of my life. I experienced many activities for the first time; the water sports at camp were the best. I knew how to swim but improved and learned three more strokes: breast stroke, butterfly, and backstroke. I learned to sail that summer, along with canoeing, and caught my first fish.

Archery was another first and has become a lifelong passion. Cabin night activities were a blast. I slept outside under the stars for the first time and can still taste the blueberry pie my cabin picked blueberries for. My counselor taught me how to tie a proper bowline knot, which I used as a commercial fisherman and tree arborist. The first time I participated in a charity was at camp. I heard the Good News while there, which led me to accept Jesus as my Savior. In 2009 I was diagnosed with primary progressive multiple sclerosis. As my walking ability declined, I remembered Romans 8:28 and started to plan things I could do in a wheelchair.

And we know that all things work together for good to those who love God, to those who are called according to His purpose. Romans 8:28

I am blessed not to be in a wheelchair yet and today operate a charity called **Sharing Serenity Inc.** to help people in wheelchairs get out on the water by means of a wheelchair accessible pontoon boat to fish or just enjoy God's creation on the waters of Cape Cod. So I would like to thank Camp Good News for the difference they made in a thirteen-year-old boy's life. I also would like to extend the services of sharing serenity by providing our twenty-six-foot pontoon boat for cabin night on Mashpee Wakeby Lake.
